

Career: Fine Art

Fine Arts is a complex field because generally, it demands that you drive your own career in fine arts and many need to build a secondary career to make ends meet financially. Because it may take many years to develop a successful career as a fine artist, it is often difficult to create a balance to maintain the energy needed to sustain a dual career. It takes determination and perseverance, with no strictly defined career path. Many people in fine arts choose to work in a related area such as arts administration, teaching or hands-on production work. Others choose to also acquire marketable design skills or skills in unrelated fields that may offer more flexibility and compensation. Artistic and creative talents can be put to work in many ways and Pratt offers the option to its students to minor in such areas as art education, communications design or computer graphics. A Fine Arts career can result in a very personal and rewarding career path. The role of the artist in society is unique and contemporary culture would not be what it is without them.

Profiles of Some Graduates

Miguel worked as a teacher at the elementary level for the NYC Board of Education and the Guggenheim Museum's Reading Through the Arts program while continuing to paint and show regularly in small galleries. He secured representation by a New York gallery ten years after graduation and continues to show annually. His teaching career changed shortly thereafter when he began to teach on the college level, first at Yeshiva University, then at Parsons School of Design. Since the teaching was on an adjunct basis, he supplemented his income as a detective in the evenings. During this period he also received a grant from the National Endowment for the Arts.

After interning with a corporate art consulting firm, Rachael accepted a full-time position following graduation. Two years later, she was promoted to a sales representative, meeting directly with the firm's clients. Within two years, she began to freelance as an art consultant with her own stable of artists. Networking with many artists and her contacts with corporations made a perfect base for her to open her own contemporary art gallery.
