Jack Travis established his namesake design studio in June 1985. To date the firm has completed projects for clients such as film director Spike Lee, actor Wesley Snipes, John Saunders of ABC sports and fashion retailer Giorgio Armani. Currently Travis is working on the flagship exhibition for the Museum of

Black Civilization in Dakar, Senegal. Jack Travis encourages investigation into Black history and culture where appropriate in his work and includes forms, motifs, materials, and colors that reflect this heritage. Travis has evolved ten principles for Black cultural Design investigation towards that aim. Travel throughout the United States, Europe, the Caribbean to West and South African countries has given Mr. Travis a most unique focus. Through his work, he continues to make a distinctive and definitive enrichment to the existing American design vocabulary. In recent years, Travis has broadened his interests beyond cultural content strategies to sustainable in environmental design methodologies, alternative educational practices such as a community design studio and the entrance of more students of color into academia and the profession.

Highly sought after for his cutting-edge views on culture and architectural design, Mr. Travis has appeared in all the prominent design publications as well as the New York Times, New York Newsday, and the Daily News. Mr. Travis has also appeared several times on shows including CNN's Style with Elsa Klinch and London's BBC television program Building Sites. Travis was one of only 8 American architects and/or celebrities chosen by the BBC. His own home and office have been published often in periodicals from the United States, England, Denmark, and South Africa. Mr. Travis' search for style begins with the Modernist Movement from early this century. He has combined his preference for the rational approach and honesty in the use of building materials with African iconography in the notions of form, space, and place perception.

Jack Travis has taught at Parsons School of Design in the Continuing Education Department and is currently an adjunct professor of interior design at Pratt Institute and at the Fashion Institute of Technology in New York City. In the Fall of 2014, he will be joining the faculty at The School of Visual Arts (SVA) also in New York City.

Mr. Travis founded AC/DC Studio (Afri-Culture/Design-Culture) in 1994, which seeks to collect, document, and disseminate information on "Black Culture" as it relates to "Environmental Design Culture". Active on the university lecture circuit, Mr. Travis is also associated with several elementary, middle, and high school mentorship programs including, Walks of Life and the prestigious Learning Through Art & Architecture. In 1992, Travis edited, African American Architects: In Current Practice, the first publication to profile the work of black architects in the United States.

In 1977 he received his Bachelor of Architecture degree from Arizona State University and in 1978 a Master of Architecture degree from the University of Illinois, Champaign- Urbana. Past appointments include an advisory position with the National American Institute of Architects (AIA) Task force on diversity in 1993 and membership of Central Harlem's Community Board 10, in Manhattan. Mr. Travis was selected as one of 12 professionals chosen nationally for HGTV's Trend Smart Team for programming consultation in 2010. He acted as "Cultural Design Consultant" on two of the largest projects in Harlem, The Kalahari Condominiums with Frederic Schwartz Architects, New York, N Y (2004-2009) & the Harlem Hospital New Patient Pavilion with HOK Architects, New York, NY. (2006-2011)

In 2004, Jack Travis received his "Fellowship" in the AIA, and in 2006 Mr. Travis was inducted into the Council of Elders" of the National Organization of Minority Architects (NOMA), the highest honor that each organization bestows upon its individual members. In 2012, Travis served on the Honors Committee for AIA NYC for two years and served the next two-years, 2015-2017, as AIA NYC Board Secretary. Jack Travis also sat on the Board of NOMA National as the Council Representative from 2013-2017.

Over the last twenty years, JTA Jack Travis ARCHITECT has been interested in creating a consulting component to our practice that would allow us, as a joint venture member, to affect the cultural design direction of all environmental design aspects for the project. Instead of being the "smaller sibling" in the joint venture structure, as historically the minority firm has been, we seek a position that allows us to affect the total design and aesthetic effort for the project. That position is one where we work directly with the lead design personality. The success of a working structure such as this relies on the fact that the client as well as the lead design personality understand and accept our mission. Further, both must be committed to the notion that a strong "cultural' expression is imperative in the design process when these large-scale projects are constructed in predominately African American neighborhoods.

Our unique approach allows for the following:

1 A unified design direction for the entire scope of the project

2 A strong cultural dynamic that reflects the sensibilities of the people living in the community that the building is primarily meant to serve

3 Attempts to expose the community residents with an environmental design identity that is appropriate and necessary

but that heretofore has been denied and/or "Hidden in Plain View"

4 Allows for a consistent and unified design effort for the project as JTA's efforts serve to supports and comment on the design personalities proposal for appropriate cultural content in the Urban Planning, Architecture, Interior Design and Landscaping for the project

5 Allows JTA in the joint venture to affect significant and important aspects of the total design effort that majority firms building in Black communities historically have not been equipped to address in more meaningful ways

6 Enables my firm the flexibility to meet WMBE participation percentage requirements of most agencies requiring such

Currently, we are involved in several commissions where this approach has been incorporated. Two such projects are the \$90M Kalahari Condominiums with Frederic Schwartz Architects and the \$120M Harlem Hospital New Patient Pavilion with Helmuth, Obata & Kassabaum (HOK). Both projects are in Central Harlem. In both instances our method of collaboration has been adopted and has proven to be profound and successful. The cultural aesthetics adopted for each project and the unique design team collaboration has truly benefited the community and has resulted in two award winning designs.

As president of a small firm, I am also involved in projects throughout Harlem and the South Bronx. I have completed over 50 projects on my own in over 27 years of practice. These projects have afforded me the opportunity to offer my own interpretation of what an "Afri-Cultural" aesthetic might be. Therefore, when faced with a joint venture opportunity such as you present, I am less burdened with the need to express my interpretation on a 'piece" of the proverbial "puzzle". Rather, I find that it is viable to be open to supporting a unified design direction as offered by the lead design personality of a firm with significant resources and a soundtrack record for the specific project type as your firm has demonstrated.

Our success and effectiveness rely on a Client who mandates that cultural aesthetics is important. From this point our design team can commit to listening to that client to assure the most appropriate avenue of

approach. JTA is anxious to commit ourselves to research, fact finding, and presenting ideas for discussion and

possibilities while we review and comment on the proposals put forth by the lead project design personality at each phase.

Large scale new projects in at-risk and low-income communities are always timely and important. We have found our concept vital to the success of these projects.
