Untangling Complex Sentences

Often when people write, they start a sentence with one idea but don't continue with that idea logically for the rest of the sentence. They also might assume the reader knows unprovided details, leaving the sentence vague and foggy. It's a great idea to read your writing aloud to yourself or to someone else to check for sentences that are confusing or illogical. Here is a chart that shows some of the main ways that sentences can become tangled and unclear:

Tangle Type	What It Is	Common Clues
Mixed Construction	Sentence begins one way but shifts structure or logic midstream	"The reason is because", gerund after noun clause, mismatched grammar pieces
Unclear Pronoun or Reference	The referent of it, this, that, they, etc. is ambiguous or missing	Too many nouns before a pronoun; vague "this" at the start of a sentence
Illogical Comparison	Compares unlike things or mismatches what's being compared	"This novel is better than Shakespeare" (author vs. book)
Overloaded Structure / Run-On	Too many ideas in one sentence without clear structure	Long chains of clauses, missing punctuation, breathless or tangled rhythm

Here are some examples of each of these types of tangles, with explanations and revisions:

MIXED CONSTRUCTION

Incorrect: The reason she left was because of wanting to find a new job.

Why it's confusing: This sentence starts as if it will explain a reason ("The reason she left was...") but then shifts into a gerund (-ing form) phrase ("because of wanting"), creating a mismatch in structure and tone.

Clearer version: The reason she left was that she wanted to find a new job.

[or, even better]

She left because she wanted to find a new job.

UNCLEAR PRONOUN OR REFERENCE

Incorrect: The committee questioned the relevance of her proposal. This highlighted a deeper issue.

Why it's confusing: We don't know what "this" refers to here: the committee's question, the relevance, or the proposal. We can guess, but we don't know for sure.

Clearer version: The committee questioned the relevance of her proposal. Their question highlighted a deeper issue: her lack of research.

ILLOGICAL COMPARISON

Incorrect: His painting is more mysterious than Van Gogh.

Why it's confusing: This compares a painting to a person, which is illogical. The comparison should be between similar categories (e.g. painting to painting).

Clearer version: His painting is more mysterious than Van Gogh's work.

[or]

His painting is more mysterious than any painting by Van Gogh.

OVERLOADED STRUCTURE OR RUN-ON

Incorrect: She wanted to study design because she liked fashion but also architecture and the way space could tell stories and make people feel things so now she's thinking about interior design or maybe even stage sets.

Why it's confusing: This sentence tries to pack too many ideas into one breathless structure. It needs punctuation and transitions to guide the reader!

Clearer version: She wanted to study design because she liked fashion and architecture. She was especially drawn to how space could tell stories and evoke emotions. Now, she's considering interior design—or even stage set design.

The critique focused on the installation's use of space, which was seen as problematic by some attendees.
