Formal Analysis: Sample Outline

A descriptive, formal, or visual analysis interprets how the elements of a work of art affect the representation of the subject matter. Analyzing the formal elements, and how these elements construct expressive content, leads to a deeper understanding of a work of art. The analysis should support a thesis—which is the main argument of the essay.

Title (think up something unique!)

- I. Introduction
 - A. Introduce the general topic
 - B. Introduce the specific topic

About the Artist (keep this brief—unless artist's life is your topic)

Title, Mediums, Dimensions, Date of work

Snapshot (what you see, as in the whole "picture")

- C. Thesis Statement (argument)
- II. First Body Paragraph (1st supporting reason)
 - A. Topic sentence
 - B. Expand and give specific details
 - C. Evidence: Quote from text or give example in the work
 - D. Analysis (analyze/connect evidence to supporting reason and argument)
- III. Second Body Paragraph (2nd supporting reason)
 - A. Topic sentence
 - B. Expand and give specific details
 - C. Evidence: Quote from text or give example in the work
 - D. Analysis (analyze/connect evidence to supporting reason and argument)
- IV. Third Body Paragraph (3rd supporting reason)
 - A. Topic sentence
 - B. Expand and give specific details
 - C. Evidence: Quote from text or give example in the work
 - D. Analysis (analyze/connect evidence to supporting reason and argument)
- V. Conclusion
 - A. Restate thesis
 - B. Summarize supporting reasons
 - C. Concluding thoughts: Point to broader implications, add a provocative insight, synthesize your argument (pull it all together), make new connections....
